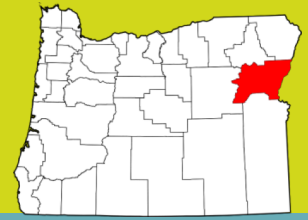






Justice Reinvestment in Baker County



Baker County received a Justice Reinvestment grant in the amount of **\$223,221** for 2017-2019 to support the following:

-  **SAFETY** People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments to determine whether they can be managed safely and effectively in the community.
-  **ACCOUNTABILITY** People receive transitional support when re-entering the community from prison including treatment and appropriate sanctions.
-  **TREATMENT** Funds are used for cognitive behavioral treatment.
-  **VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence.
