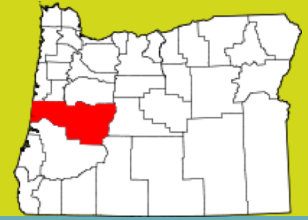






Justice Reinvestment in Lane County



Lane County received two Justice Reinvestment grants in the amount of **\$3.71 million** and **\$722,556** for 2017-2019 to support the following:

-  **SAFETY** People undergo thorough assessments to determine their needs to succeed in the community incl. housing, mentors, and employment training.
-  **ACCOUNTABILITY** Lane County Parole and Probation provide evidence-based supervision incl. cognitive-based exercises and other skill building tools.
-  **TREATMENT** People receive health care, mental health services, and addiction services tailored to their needs.
-  **VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic violence and child abuse.


How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?
