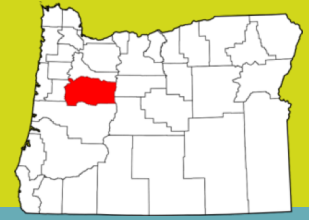


# Justice Reinvestment in Linn County



Linn County received a Justice Reinvestment grant in the amount of **\$1.65 million** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



**SAFETY** Thorough risk assessments and evidence-based tools are used to develop case plans promoting effective transition from jail to community-based services.



**ACCOUNTABILITY** People receive thorough risk and needs assessments to inform individual transition and supervision plans.



**TREATMENT** Funds are used for substance use disorder treatment, cognitive behavior treatment, and housing and transportation assistance.



**VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence and child abuse.

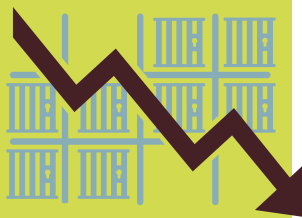
## How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?

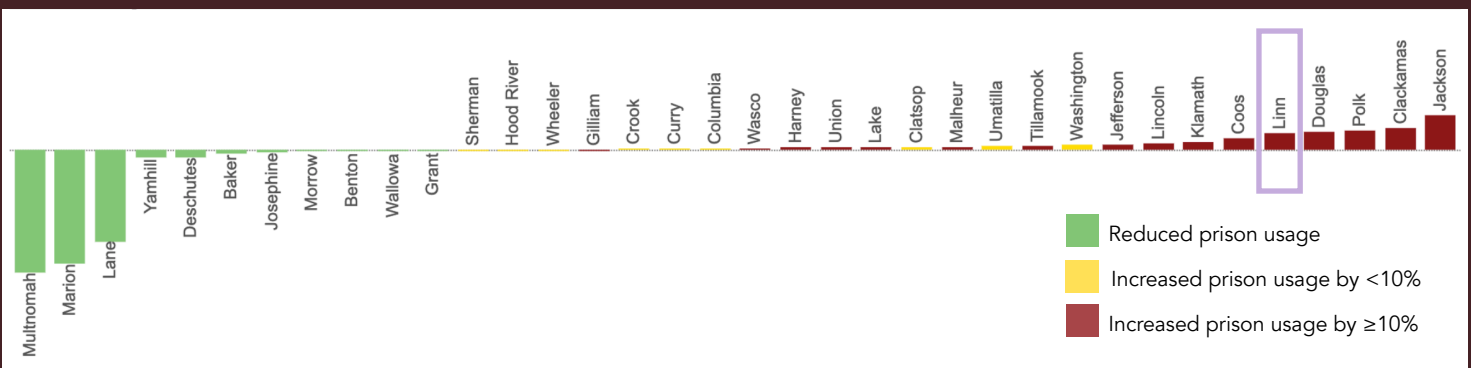
