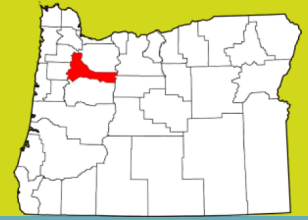


# Justice Reinvestment in Marion County



Marion County received two Justice Reinvestment grants in the amount of **\$3.75 million** and **197,676** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



**SAFETY** People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments as part of an evidence-based sentencing program.



**ACCOUNTABILITY** People receive enhanced supervision and case management.



**TREATMENT** People receive mental health and addiction treatment services tailored to their needs.



**VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence and child abuse.



**FAMILY SUPPORT** Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence and child abuse.

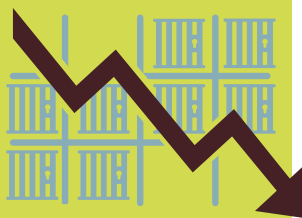
## How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?

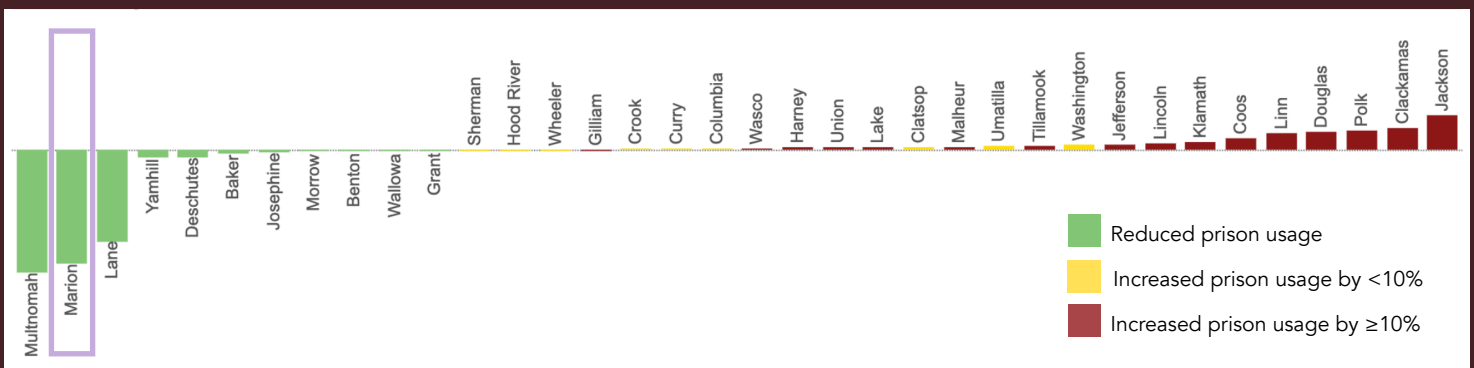
