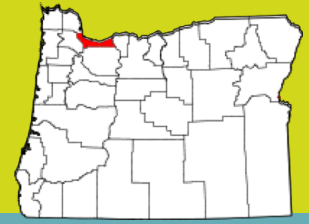


Justice Reinvestment in Multnomah County



Multnomah County received two Justice Reinvestment grants in the amount of **\$7.9 million and \$1.7 million** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



SAFETY People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments to determine whether they can be managed safely and effectively in the community.



ACCOUNTABILITY The Department of Community Justice provide 120 days of intensive community supervision.



TREATMENT People receive mental health and addiction treatment services tailored to their needs.



VICTIM SERVICES Ten percent of Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic violence and child abuse.

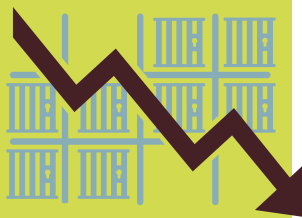
How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?
