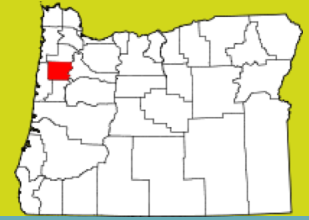


Justice Reinvestment in Polk County



Polk County received a Justice Reinvestment grant in the amount of **\$597,913** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



SAFETY People receive assistance navigating needed services including enrollment through Oregon Health Plan, employment, transportation to treatment groups.



ACCOUNTABILITY People receive enhanced supervision and case management.



TREATMENT Drug Court Aftercare support will increase from monthly to weekly meetings.



VICTIM SERVICES Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence and child abuse.



HOUSING Increased housing options will offer individuals opportunities to maintain supervision compliance and increase the likelihood of family reunification.

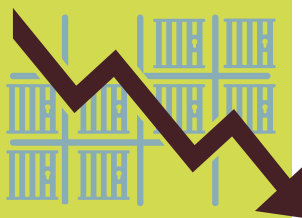
How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?

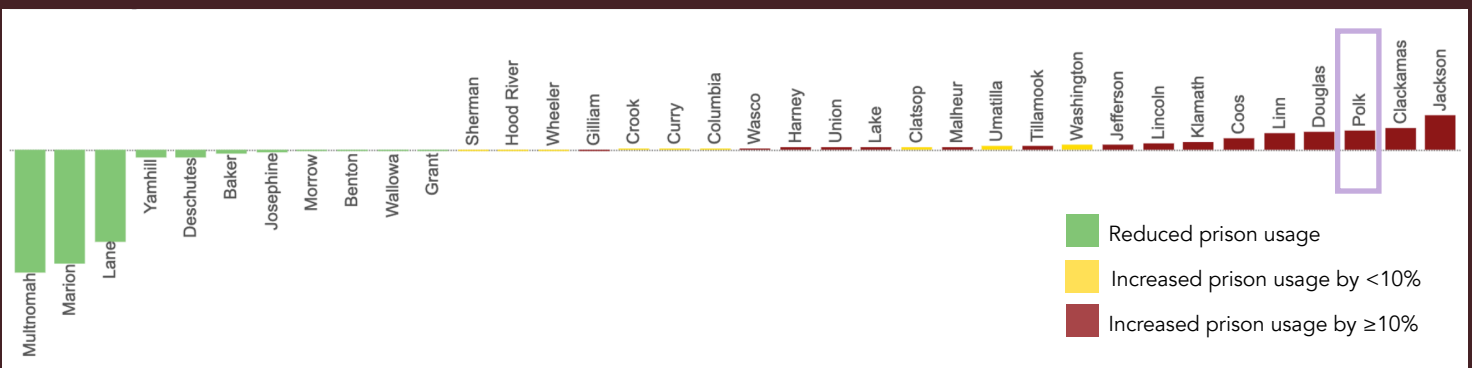
