- Safely reduce prison use

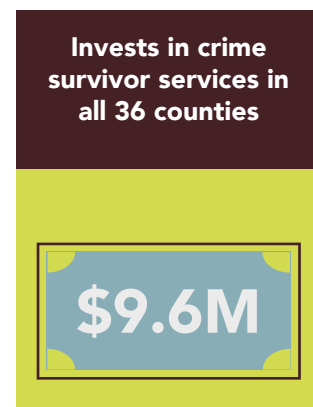
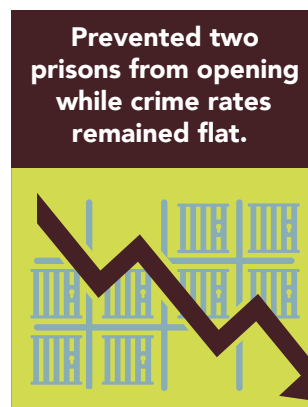
For Oregon's 2019-21 biennium, all 36 counties were invited to apply for funding to support programs that reduce recidivism and decrease prison use while ensuring accountability and public safety.

Most counties are on track to succeed in achieving these goals. Those that were not received provisional, one-year grants.

For 2019-2020, Umatilla County received a provisional grant of \$461,754 for:*

-  **ACCOUNTABILITY** such as supervision and local sanctions, risk assessments, and evidence-based tools used to develop appropriate plans for public safety.
-  **TREATMENT** programs that can include addiction, mental health, and cognitive behavior treatment, including treatment in jail.
-  **10% FOR VICTIM SERVICES** for crime survivors, including domestic and sexual violence and for children who have been abused or neglected.
