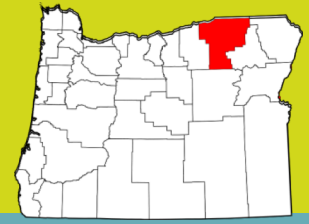


# Justice Reinvestment in Umatilla County



Umatilla County received a Justice Reinvestment grant in the amount of **\$916,800** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



**SAFETY** People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments to determine whether they can be managed safely and effectively in the community.



**ACCOUNTABILITY** People receive transitional support when re-entering the community from prison incl. treatment, a Day reporting program, and appropriate sanctions.



**TREATMENT** Funds are used for addiction treatment and cognitive behavioral treatment.



**VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic and sexual violence.

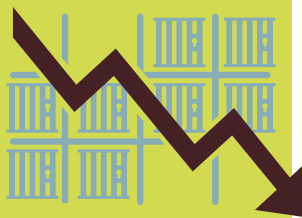
## How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?
