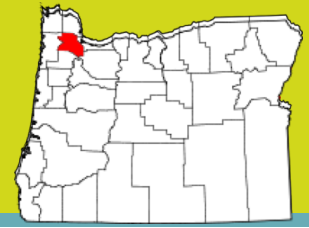






# Justice Reinvestment in Washington County



Washington County received two Justice Reinvestment grants in the amount of **\$3.7 million** and **\$570,289** for 2017-2019 to support the following:

-  **SAFETY** People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments to determine whether they can be managed safely and effectively in the community.
-  **ACCOUNTABILITY** People receive intensive community supervision.
-  **TREATMENT** People receive mental health and dual diagnosis counseling services tailored to their needs.
-  **VICTIM SERVICES** Ten percent of Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of domestic violence and child abuse.


## How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?

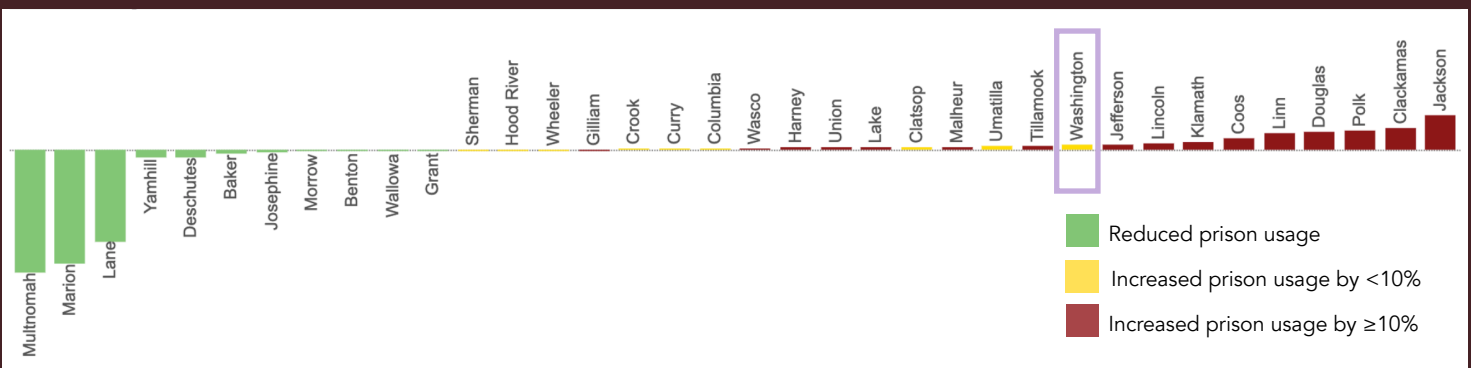
