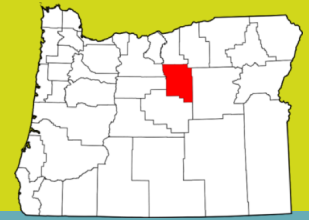


Justice Reinvestment in Wheeler County



Wheeler County received a Justice Reinvestment grant in the amount of **\$100,000** for 2017-2019 to support the following:



SAFETY People undergo thorough risk and needs assessments to determine whether they can be managed safely and effectively in the community.



ACCOUNTABILITY People receive transitional support when re-entering the community from prison.



TREATMENT People receive transitional support when re-entering the community from prison.



VICTIM SERVICES Ten percent of the county's Justice Reinvestment funds are used to support victims of crime through community-based assistance.

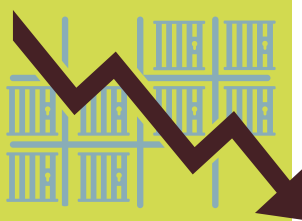
How has Justice Reinvestment improved Oregon's approach to public safety?

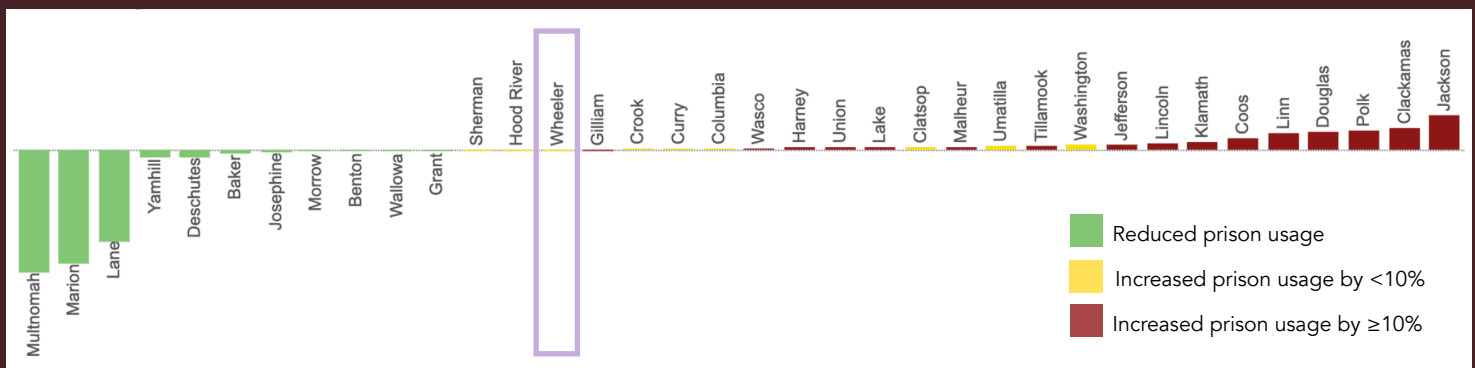
